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SET 1 - DO

1. DO YOUR HOMEWORK

Definition: Complete your assigned schoolwork or tasks.

Examples:

- 1. Sarah, make sure to do your homework before going out with your friends tonight.
- 2. He couldn't go to the party because he had to do his homework for tomorrow's class

2. DO THE DISHES

Definition: Wash and clean the dishes and kitchen utensils after a meal.

Examples.

- 1. After dinner, it's your turn to do the dishes tonight.
- 2. I don't mind cooking, but someone else needs to volunteer to do the dishes.

3. DO YOUR BEST

Definition: Give maximum effort or perform to the best of your ability.

Examples.

- Even though the competition is tough, I'll do my best to win the race.
- 2. The team didn't win, but they certainly did their best in the championship game.

4. DO A FAVOR

Definition: Help someone by performing a kind or helpful action

Examples:

- I. Can you do me a favor and pick up some groceries on your way home?
- 2. I'll be happy to do you a favor by watching your dog while you're on vacation.

5. DO THE LAUNDRY

Definition: Wash, dry, and fold your clothes and other garments.

- 1. I need to set aside some time this weekend to do the laundry.
- 2. She prefers to do the laundry in the evening so she can relax on weekends.

6. DO BUSINESS

Definition: Engage in commercial or trade activities.

Examples:

- 1. His family has been in the restaurant business; they do business all over the city.
 - 2. It's essential to do business ethically and maintain a good reputation.

7. DO A PROJECT

Definition: Work on and complete a specific task or assignment

Examples:

- 1. We need to do a project together for the science fair; any ideas?
- 2. I have to do a project for work that's due by the end of the week

8. DO RESEARCH

Definition: Conduct a systematic investigation to gather information or knowledge.

Examples.

- 1. Researchers do research to better understand the causes of climate change.
- 2. Before making a decision, it's crucial to do some research to gather all the facts

9. DO EXERCISES

Definition: Engage in physical activities for health or fitness.

Examples:

- 1. To stay fit and healthy, I try to do exercises at the gym three times a week.
- 2. She enjoys hiking in the mountains as a way to do exercises and connect with nature

10. DO YOGA

Definition: Practice a system of physical and mental exercises for well-being.

- I. Many people find it beneficial to do yoga to start their day with a clear mind.
- Doing yoga regularly has helped her reduce stress and improve her flexibility.



SET 2 - MAKE

11. MAKE A DECISION

Definition: Choose or reach a conclusion about something.

Examples:

- 1. It took a while to make a decision, but I've finally decided to study abroad.
- 2. Let's discuss the pros and cons before we make a decision on which car to buy.

12. MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Definition: Have a positive impact or effect on a situation or outcome

Examples:

- . Your support and encouragement can make a difference in the lives of these childrer
 - 2. Volunteering your time can make a difference in the local community

13. MAKE A PLAN

Definition: Create a strategy or course of action.

Examples.

- fore our road trip, let's make a plan to ensure we visit all the places we want to see
 - 2. Successful entrepreneurs often make a plan outlining their business goals.

14. MAKE A CHOICE

Definition: Select an option from available alternatives.

Examples:

- 1. It can be challenging to make a choice when there are so many items on the menu
- 2. We need to make a choice between renovating our home or moving to a new one

15. MAKE A PHONE CALL

Definition: Place a telephone call to someone.

- 1. I'll make a phone call to the client to discuss the project's details.
 - Don't forget to make a phone call to your grandparents.



SET 2 - MAKE

16. MAKE A RESERVATION

Definition: Book or secure a spot or service in advance.

Examples:

- 1. It's advisable to make a reservation at the restaurant for Saturday night.
- 2. We should make a reservation for the hotel as soon as possible to secure a room

17. MAKE PROGRESS

Definition: Move forward or improve in a particular area.

Examples.

- 1. With consistent effort, you'll make progress in your language skills
- The team has been working hard, and we're starting to see some real progress

18. MAKE AN EFFORT

Definition: Put energy or attempt to achieve something.

Examples.

- She always makes an effort to be punctual for meetings.
- 2. If you make an effort to practice every day, you'll improve your musical skills.

19. MAKE A STATEMENT

Definition: Express a clear opinion or convey a strong message.

Examples:

- 1. Her bold choice of outfit certainly made a statement at the party.
- 2. The artist's painting makes a statement about the environment and climate change

20. MAKE A COMMITMENT

Definition: Promise or pledge to do something or follow through on an obligation.

- 1. Before joining the club, you need to make a commitment to attend regular meetings
 - 2. They made a commitment to each other to support their dreams and aspirations



SET 3 - TAKE

21. TAKE A BREAK

Definition: Pause or rest briefly from an activity.

Examples:

- 1. After working for hours on the computer, it's essential to take a break.
 - 2. Let's take a break and have a cup of tea before we continue.

22. TAKE A NAP

Definition: Have a short sleep, typically during the day.

Examples:

- 1. I often take a nap in the afternoon to recharge my energy.
- 2. If you're feeling tired, a 20-minute nap can make a big difference.

23. TAKE A SHOWER

Definition: Cleanse the body by standing under flowing water.

Examples:

- 1. I need to take a shower and get ready before the party tonight.
- 2. After a long hike, it's so refreshing to take a shower and wash off the sweat.

24. TAKE A WALK

Definition: Go for a leisurely stroll or walk outdoors.

Examples:

- 1. Let's take a walk in the park and enjoy the beautiful weather.
 - I like to take a walk along the beach to clear my mind.

25. TAKE A CHANCE

Definition: Risk or attempt something uncertain.

- Sometimes, you have to take a chance to achieve your goals.
 - 2. He decided to take a chance and invest in the startup.



SET 3 - TAKE

26. TAKE A PHOTO

Definition: Capture an image using a camera.

Examples:

- 1. The sunset was so stunning that I had to take a photograph of it.
- 2. She loves to take photographs of nature and wildlife during her travels.

27. TAKE A MESSAGE

Definition: Receive and record a message for someone.

Examples.

- 1. While I'm away, please take a message for me if anyone calls
- 2. The receptionist will take a message and make sure it gets to the right person.

28. TAKE A RISK

Definition: Engage in a situation with an uncertain outcome.

Examples:

- 1. Entrepreneurship often involves the willingness to take a risk for potential rewards
- 2. We need to decide whether to take a risk and invest in this venture or play it safe.

29. TAKE A HINT

Definition: Understand or perceive a subtle suggestion or clue.

Examples:

- 1. She yawned during the meeting, she didn't take the hint that we needed her input
 - 2. I've been dropping hints about my birthday, I hope you'll take the hint.

30. TAKE A STAND

Definition: Express and maintain a particular position or viewpoint.

- 1. It's important to take a stand on issues you care about and advocate for change.
- The organization decided to take a stand against discrimination and intolerance



SET 4 - GET

31. GET A JOB

Definition: Find employment or secure work.

Examples:

- 1. After months of searching, she finally got a job as a graphic designer.
- . Getting a job can be challenging, but sooner or later you can get a job that you enjoy

32. GET A HAIRCUT

Definition: Have your hair trimmed or styled by a professional.

Examples.

- 1. I'm planning to get a haircut this weekend and try a new hairstyle.
- 2. He decided to get a haircut to freshen up his appearance for the job interview.

33. GET A DEGREE

Definition: Earn an academic qualification or diploma.

Examples:

- 1. She worked hard for years to get a degree in engineering.
- 2. Earning a bachelor's degree is an important milestone in many people's lives.

34. GET MARRIED

Definition: Enter into a legal or formal union with a spouse.

Examples:

- 1. They are planning to get married in a small, intimate ceremony.
 - Getting married is a celebration of love and commitment.

35. GET A PROMOTION

Definition: Receive an advancement or raise in your career.

Examples.

- 1. After years of dedication, he finally got a promotion to a managerial position.
- 2. She was thrilled to get a promotion and take on more responsibilities at work



SET 4 - GET

36. GET A TICKET

Definition: Obtain a pass or permission for an event or transportation.

Examples:

- 1. Don't forget to get a ticket for the concert before they sell out
- 2. We need to get tickets for the train ride to the city next weekend.

37. GET AN EDUCATION

Definition: Receive instruction and training in a formal setting.

Examples:

- Access to quality education is essential for children to get an education.
 - 2. Many individuals return to school later in life to get an education.

38. GET A RAISE

Definition: Receive an increase in salary or wages.

Examples:

- 1. He worked diligently and was delighted to get a raise after the performance review
 - Negotiating with your employer is one way to get a raise.

39. GET A GIFT

Definition: Acquire a present or something given to you.

Examples:

- 1. She was surprised to get a gift from her coworkers on her last day at the office
 - 2. Getting a thoughtful gift can brighten anyone's day.

40. GET A CHANCE

Definition: Have an opportunity or possibility to do something.

- 1. If you get a chance, I recommend visiting the art museum downtown.
- They were excited to get a chance to travel to Europe for the first time



SET 5 - GIVE

41. GIVE A GIFT

Definition: Present someone with a token of affection or generosity.

Examples:

- 1. I want to give a gift to my sister for her birthday, but I'm not sure what she'd like
 - 2. It's a custom to give gifts during the holiday season to show appreciation.

42. GIVE ADVICE

Definition: Offer suggestions or recommendations to help someone.

Examples:

- 1. She often turns to her parents for advice when making important life decisions
 - 2. If you need advice on where to go on vacation, just ask.

43. GIVE A HAND

Definition: Provide assistance or help with a task

Examples:

- 1. Can you give me a hand moving this heavy furniture upstairs?
- 2. When organizing a charity event, volunteers are always needed to give a hand.

44. GIVE AN OPINION

Definition: Share your thoughts or viewpoint on a matter.

Examples:

- 1. It's essential for everyone to give their opinion during team meetings.
- 2. I'd like to give my opinion on this issue because I think it's important.

45. GIVE A SPEECH

Definition: Deliver a formal presentation or address to an audience.

- 1. The CEO will give a speech at the company's annual conference.
- 2. It can be nerve-wracking to give a speech in front of a large audience



SET 5 - GIVE

46. GIVE A COMPLIMENT

Definition: Express admiration or praise to someone.

Examples:

- 1. Don't forget to give a compliment to the chef; the meal was fantastic.
 - 2. She appreciated the compliment about her new hairstyle.

47. GIVE A PRESENTATION

Definition: Speak or demonstrate on a specific topic

Examples.

- 1. Tomorrow, I'll give a presentation on the latest market trends in the tech industry
 - To ace the class, you'll need to give a presentation on a historical event.

48. GIVE A RECOMMENDATION

Definition: Offer a favorable suggestion or endorsement.

Examples:

- 1. Can you give me a recommendation for a good book to read this summer?
- I asked my former boss to give me a recommendation for my job application.

49. GIVE A WARNING

Definition: Provide notice or caution about a potential danger.

Examples:

I. The lifeguard will give a warning if the water conditions become unsafe for swimming

50. GIVE A SHOUT-OUT

Definition: Publicly acknowledge someone for their efforts or achievements.

- 1. They'll give a shout-out to the volunteers who made the event possible.
- 2. I want to give a shout-out to my amazing team for their hard work on this project



SET 6 - KEEP

51, KEEP A SECRET

Definition: Refrain from sharing confidential information.

Examples:

- 1. I can trust her to keep a secret; she's never betrayed my confidence before.
 - 2. It's crucial to keep a secret when entrusted with sensitive information.

52. KEEP A PROMISE

Definition: Fulfill or honor a commitment made to someone.

Examples.

- 1. He always does his best to keep his promises to his children.
- 2. I'll make sure to keep my promise and attend your art show next week.

53. KEEP THE PEACE

Definition: Maintain a state of calm or prevent conflicts.

Examples:

- 1. The diplomats worked tirelessly to keep the peace between the two nations
- 2. In a crowded household, it's essential to keep the peace to maintain harmony.

54. KEEP IN TOUCH

Definition: Stay connected or maintain contact with someone.

Examples:

- i. Even though we live in different cities, we keep in touch through regular video calls
 - 2. It's been years since we last met, but we still keep in touch on social media.

55. KEEP A JOURNAL

Definition: Write down personal thoughts and experiences regularly.

- 1. Writing in a journal helps me reflect on my day and emotions.
- She decided to keep a journal to document her travels and adventures.



SET 6 - KEEP

56. KEEP A STRAIGHT FACE

Definition: Refrain from showing emotion or laughter in a serious situation.

Examples:

- 1. Despite the comedian's jokes, he managed to keep a straight face while performing
- . During the serious discussion, it was challenging for everyone to keep a straight face

57. KEEP THE FAITH

Definition: Maintain belief or trust in someone or something.

Examples.

- 1. In difficult times, it's essential to keep the faith and believe that things will get better
 - 2. She keeps the faith that her hard work will eventually lead to success

58. KEEP A CLOSE WATCH

Definition: Monitor or supervise closely.

Examples.

- The security team will keep a close watch on the premises during the event
 - As a parent, it's natural to keep a close watch on your child's activities.

59. KEEP AN EYE ON

Definition: Watch or observe something or someone attentively.

Examples:

- 1. Can you keep an eye on my bag while I use the restroom?
- 2. It's important to keep an eye on the weather forecast when planning outdoor events

60. KEEP YOUR WORD

Definition: Fulfill a promise or commitment as pledged.

- 1. He always keeps his word, so you can trust that he'll be there on time.
- 2. Keeping your word is a sign of integrity and reliability in personal relationships



SET 7 - CATCH

61. CATCH A COLD

Definition: Become infected with a common respiratory illness.

Examples:

- 1. She caught a cold after being exposed to the flu virus at work.
- . To avoid catching a cold, remember to wash your hands frequently during flu seaso

62. CATCH A BALL

Definition: Intercept and hold a thrown or hit ball

Examples.

- 1. He made an incredible play to catch the ball before it went over the fence.
 - 2. I need to improve my skills and catch the ball more consistently.

63. CATCH THE BUS

Definition: Board a public transportation vehicle.

Examples:

- We need to hurry if we want to catch the bus to downtown.
- I missed my alarm and couldn't catch the bus to work this morning

64. CATCH A THIEF

Definition: Apprehend or stop someone attempting theft.

Examples:

- The quick-thinking security guard managed to catch the thief red-handed
- 2. It's essential to catch a thier to prevent further there and protect others.

65. CATCH A GLIMPSE

Definition: See something briefly or momentarily.

- 1. As the curtain lifted, the audience got to catch a glimpse of the stunning set design.
 - 2. I was lucky to catch a glimpse of the rare bird before it flew away



SET 7 – CATCH

66. CATCH A MOVIE

Definition: Watch a film at a cinema.

Examples:

- 1. Let's catch a movie this weekend; there's a new release I've been wanting to see.
 - 2. I enjoy going to the theater to catch a movie on the big screen.

67. CATCH A WAVE

Definition: Ride a breaking wave, often in surfing.

Examples:

- Surfers from around the world flock to this beach to catch a wave.
- 2. Learning to catch a wave is challenging but incredibly rewarding

68. CATCH A TRAIN

Definition: Board and travel on a railway locomotive.

Examples:

- I. We need to leave early to catch the train to the conference
- 2. If you don't catch the train on time, you'll miss the meeting.

69. CATCH A FLIGHT

Definition: Board an aircraft for a journey.

Examples:

- 1. We need to hurry to the airport to catch our flight to the tropical island.
- 2. She arrived early to ensure she would catch her flight to the international conferenc

70. CATCH SOMEONE'S EYE

Definition: Attract someone's attention or notice.

- 1. The colorful artwork in the gallery caught my eye immediately.
- His unique fashion style always manages to catch people's eyes at events.



SET 8 - COME

71. COME HOME

Definition: Return to your place of residence.

Examples:

- 1. After a long day at work, there's nothing better than coming home to relax
 - They can't wait to come home and see their family during the holidays.

72. COME BACK

Definition: Return to a previous location or state.

Examples:

- She promised to come back to visit her hometown after moving abroad.
 - 2. I hope the warm weather comes back soon; I miss sunny days.

73. COME EARLY

Definition: Arrive before the expected or appointed time.

Examples:

- 1. To ensure you get a good seat, it's best to come early to the concert.
 - Let's come early to the party to help with the preparations.

74. COME LATE

Definition: Arrive after the scheduled time.

Examples:

- 1. I'm sorry I came late to the meeting; there was unexpected traffic
 - Please don't come late to the movie; it's starting on time.

75. COME PREPARED

Definition: Arrive with the necessary items or information.

- l. The hikers were well-equipped and came prepared with food and first-aid supplies
 - To succeed in the competition, it's crucial to come prepared.



SET 8 - COME

76. COME OVER

Definition: Visit someone's home or location.

Examples:

- 1. Why don't you come over to my place for dinner this weekend?
- 2. I'm feeling a bit lonely; would you like to come over and watch a movie?

77. COME TO A DECISION

Definition: Reach a conclusion or make a choice.

Examples

- 1. After hours of debate, the committee finally came to a decision.
- 2. It's time to come to a decision about where to go for our summer vacation.

78. COME TO AN AGREEMENT

Definition: Reach a consensus or understanding.

Examples:

- l. The two parties in the negotiation were able to come to an agreement on the terms
- 2. It can be challenging, but it's essential to come to an agreement in any partnership

79. COME TO A CONCLUSION

Definition: Reach a final judgment or decision.

Examples:

- The detective was able to come to a conclusion about the crime.
- 2. Let's discuss the options and come to a conclusion about the best course of action

80. COME TO A COMPROMISE

Definition: Reach a mutual agreement or settlement.

- Both parties are willing to come to a compromise during disagreements.
 - 2. The two countries had to come to a compromise to avoid a trade war



SET 9 - BREAK

81. BREAK A RECORD

Definition: Set a new achievement or surpass a previous one.

Examples:

- 1. The swimmer broke a record by finishing the race in record time.
- 2. Her incredible performance broke records for ticket sales at the box office.

82. BREAK A HABIT

Definition: Stop a routine or behavior, often a bad one.

Examples:

- 1. It can be challenging to break a habit like smoking, but it's worth the effort.
 - 2. She needs to break the habit of checking her phone constantly.

83. BREAK THE NEWS

Definition: Share important or significant information.

Examples:

- It's never easy to break the news of a loved one's passing.
- 2. Our manager gathered us to break the news about the company's restructuring.

84. BREAK A PROMISE

Definition: Fail to keep one's commitment or word.

Examples:

- l. I'm disappointed that he broke his promise to help with the project.
- 2. Trust is easily eroded when someone breaks a promise repeatedly.

85. BREAK A WINDOW

Definition: Shatter or damage a glass window.

- 1. He accidentally broke a window while playing baseball in the backyard.
- The strong winds during the storm caused several branches to break a window.



SET 9 - BREAK

86. BREAK A LEG

Definition: Wish someone good luck, especially in the theater.

Examples:

- 1. "Break a leg!" I said to my friend before their big stage performance.
- It's a tradition in the theater to say "break a leg" instead of "good luck.

87. BREAK THE ICE

Definition: Ease tension or initiate conversation in a social setting.

Examples.

- . At the networking event, the host told a joke to break the ice and get people talking
 - 2. Playing a game of "Two Truths and a Lie" is a fun way to break the ice at parties.

88. BREAK A RULE

Definition: Violate or disregard a specified regulation.

Examples:

- 1. It's essential to have consequences for those who break rules in a classroom.
 - 2. He was penalized for breaking a rule during the soccer match.

89. BREAK THE CYCLE

Definition: Stop a recurring pattern or sequence.

Examples:

- 1. She sought therapy to break the cycle of unhealthy relationships.
- 2. To address the issue, it's important to break the cycle of procrastination.

90. BREAK A TIE

Definition: Determine a winner or resolve a draw in competition.

- 1. In the event of a tie, they will break a tie with a sudden-death round.
- 2. The penalty shootout will break the tie and determine the championship winner



SET 10 - PAY

91. PAY ATTENTION

Definition: Focus one's mind on something.

Examples:

- 1. It's important to pay attention during the safety briefing on the plane.
- 2. If you want to learn, you must pay attention in class and take good notes.

92. PAY RESPECT

Definition: Express admiration, gratitude, or praise.

Examples.

- l. The military ceremony was a way to pay respect to those who served and sacrificed
 - 2. People often pay their respects by leaving flowers at a memorial

93. PAY TRIBUTE

Definition: Returning to the initial planning or development stage after a failure.

Examples.

- The concert was a tribute to the legendary musician who passed away.
- At the retirement party, colleagues payed tribute to their departing coworker.

94. PAY DIVIDENDS

Definition: Provide financial returns on an investment

Examples:

- 1. Investing in stocks can pay dividends in the long run if chosen wisely.
- 2. The decision to expand the business eventually paid dividends in increased profits

95. PAY ROYALTIES

Definition: Provide compensation for the use of intellectual property.

- 1. Authors and musicians receive royalties when their work is used in films.
 - Companies must pay royalties to use patented technologies



SET 10 - PAY

96. PAY HOMAGE

Definition: Show deep respect or honor.

Examples:

- 1. The art exhibition was a way to pay homage to the artist's legacy.
- People often pay homage to historical figures through monuments.

97. PAY INTEREST

Definition: Give money for the use of borrowed funds.

Examples.

- 1. When you take out a loan, you'll need to pay interest on the borrowed amount.
- The bank account accrues interest, allowing you to pay interest to your savings

98. PAY BY CREDIT CARD

Definition: Use a credit card for a financial transaction.

Examples:

- It's convenient to pay by credit card when shopping online.
- I usually pay by credit card for big purchases to earn rewards points.

99. PAY IN CASH

Definition: Use physical money for a purchase.

Examples:

- 1. Some businesses offer discounts if you pay in cash rather than using a credit card
 - 2. When traveling abroad, it's helpful to pay in cash for small expenses

Definition: Make a payment using the internet or electronic methods.
